LAB WORK

Ralph Waldo Emerson often asked friends, "What has become clear to you since we last met?" What a question! I try to imagine what I would say. I know that I'd be too stunned to speak even if the question weren't posed by someone of Emerson's fame. The question is, however, similar to traditional queries asked by Friends. "How is the spirit moving in your life" and "How does the truth prosper among you". While Emerson challenged friends to account for their intellectual life, Friends are challenged by the queries to examine their spiritual life.

One of the ways that Quakers have wrestled with such questions over the last 350 years is through journal writing, autobiographies that chronicle their struggles on the spiritual journey. We believe in the possibility of continuing revelation, and in the even more radical idea that God can use ordinary folk to speak about these revelations and deliver messages on living a Spirit-led life. This revolutionary discovery that any one of us can be a channel for the Spirit gives us the courage to listen and be guided by the Spirit in writing.

I began writing a diary when I was in fourth grade encouraged by a teacher who taught me to believe that what I thought was important and worth recording. At first, I kept detailed notes of everyday events but then, after the initial excitement wore off, I just wrote as the mood dictated. During the next forty years, this pattern continued with times of needing to write everyday, to describe observations, relationships, travel, grief and excitement, usually followed by periods where the journal notes were short and intermittent. Now I search for the presence of the Spirit as I record the big changes in life, and ordinary daily events. Sometimes there are notes about the weather and the beauty of bare trees in winter. Other

times, I contemplate a line from a poem, or write the whole poem as a way of absorbing the message. There are days when a few notes about how tired I am, or how bad the news is leads me to a deeper place of simply resting in the arms of a loving God. Journal writing continues to be the best way for me to take stock, and to respond to the query, "How is the Spirit moving in your life?" especially when I'm feeling lost or abandoned.

A wonderful Friend, Bill Kreidler said, "Just when you think you have God all figured out, life sends you some lab work", and I realize that the journal is my lab work and notes. Like lab notes documenting experiments, writing helps me take small steps toward a deeper understanding of everyday experience, to see connections among seemingly disparate events and opens me to new truths. I often only verify what others have already discovered, but the discovery becomes mine. I know the truth experimentally. Important new discoveries come from asking the right questions, learning how to frame or re-frame a question in such a way that I move beyond my own prejudices.

Reading the journals of others who wrestle with the Spirit convinces me that my lab notes record experience that is both unique and universal. In the book, *Journal of a Solitude*, I feel not only a sense of connection to the writer, May Sarton, but God speaks to me through her. "The big question", she writes, "...is how to hope and what to hope for. How to keep cool and get hold of the essential and, above all, how to recognize the essential". In reading the journals of others who struggle with these questions and in writing, I open myself to being teachable and to becoming a teacher. I write to nurture my spiritual self, to stay in touch with God, to do my lab work.

Lape, a former member of SAYMA and presently a clerk of Westbury Meeting, confronts issues of breaches of what Friends call "right order" in Meetings for Worship and those with Attention to Business familiar to Friends in many meetings of various sizes. He says, "The offenses were typical: chronic lateness to meeting and entering in a loud and noisy fashion, using meeting for worship to debate controversial matters, or to criticize the meeting for failing to do one thing or another, refusal to recognize the authority of the clerk to run an orderly business meeting, and the usual instances of tale bearing, detraction, and lack of care for the reputations of others, especially those with whom Friends are in conflict." The authority to elder and discipline vested in the Ministry and Worship Committee, and similar committees in other meetings, would reduce the disruptive instances listed above. Practical Hints for Clerks

Since nearly everyone will be a clerk at some time or need to understand the process of Quaker clerking, the editor offers this list.

The following list was derived from suggestions made at the FGC Ministry and Nurture consultation for yearly meeting clerks in 2005. It is offered here for monthly meetings in the spirit of viewing all clerking as ministry, whether for a monthly or yearly meeting committee.

- Ask one or two Friends to hold the meeting in prayer during meeting for worship to attend to business. If a committee is experiencing difficulty, a committee clerk may also request a prayerful presence during the committee meeting(s).
- If needed, invite Friends to return to Silence to help find the sense of meeting.
- Be aware of teachable moments.
- Have phrases you can use in needed moments - some clerks bring meaningful phrases with them that they can turn to as needed.
- Be aware of where you are on any given concern brought before the meeting and stand aside if you are too involved to be able to clerk a particular piece. (This should not happen too often.) This includes moving physically away from the clerks' table for all discussion of the concern through the minuting of an action. The assistant or recording clerk usually serves as clerk during that time.
- Remember that clerks don't have the answers - our work is to help discern the sense of the meeting.
- Remember that you don't have to call on everyone whose hand is raised. The person called on may have spoken to others' concerns as well. Calling on everyone can serve to encourage Friends to repeat themselves and carry on discussion well after the clerk has come to clarity of the sense of the meeting.
- If many have spoken the clerk may ask a person whose hand is up if this is something new or if he/she is affirming what has already been said. This helps Friends come to understand that they have reached a sense of the meeting and that it is time to form a minute.
- Things the assistant clerk can help with include: helping clerks find clarity; serving as clerk if the clerk needs to stand aside or be absent from a session; honing a difficult minute; helping the clerk keep tabs of physical energy in the meeting...stretch breaks etc.
- When facing a problem of too little time and too many agenda items, the meeting can help make the decision of what to leave out and how best to use their remaining time.
- Pray without ceasing - we are servants of God.

1. Approval of Minutes of Third Month Meeting for Worship with Attention to Business.

Minute 09-05-01: Atlanta Friends Meeting approves the minutes of Meeting for Worship with Attention to Business of Fourth Month 2009 with corrections.

2. Administration.

Georgia Lord reported that Valerie Barlow, our current Friend in Residence, will be moving to Savannah, Georgia, to start a new job. The meeting approved a minute of appreciation for Valerie.

Minute 09-05-02: During her service as the Friend in Residence, Valerie Barlow's welcoming presence in the Meeting House has been such a gift to us as a community. She conveyed a sense that the Meeting House was not only her home, but our home. She brought her extensive knowledge of the Meeting and her energetic support to many meeting efforts, including the Family Fun Retreat. We are sorry to lose her presence in the Meeting House but happy that she is going on to other important work.

The Administration Committee suggested that the meeting would benefit from having a Personnel Liaison position. Among other things, this would help the meeting direct feedback to and from employees. Administration has drafted a description of the duties of this volunteer position and requests feedback. This liaison would ideally become an in-house expert on Meeting hiring policies, etc. and a resource for committees.

Georgia reminded the meeting that we will need to resume the search process to find a new Friend in Residence. Friends had various ideas how best to form a search committee, and eventually the meeting agreed that the old search committee would be revived and that spots would be filled where people were no longer able to serve on the committee.

Minute 09-05-03: The meeting approves current members of the Friend in Residence Search Committee moving ahead to publicize the open Friend in Residence position. Meanwhile, the Nominating Committee will confirm current members of the Search Committee and bring forth names to Meeting for Business to fill any open positions on the committee.

3. Ministry & Worship.

Suzan Kenworthy requested final approval for Heather Barbour's membership.

Minute 09-05-04: Atlanta Friends Meeting approves Heather Barbour's request to become a member.

Suzan presented a first request for membership for Harry Lefever, and read the corresponding letter he wrote requesting membership. He has met with a clearness committee. Approval will be sought in Sixth Month.

Suzan asked the meeting's approval for a traveling minute to be issued to Ceal and Mark Wutka supporting their travels to North Carolina Yearly Meeting Conservative.

Minute 09-05-05: On the recommendation of the Ministry and Worship Committee, Atlanta Friends Meeting approves the following traveling minute: The Atlanta Monthly Meeting is glad to provide Ceal and Mark Wutka this travel minute in support of their plans to again participate in the annual gathering of North Carolina Yearly Meeting. They are active members of our meeting and have found significant inspiration from your annual gathering.

The clerk will issue the travel minute on behalf of the meeting.

4. Naming.

Perry Treadwell brought forth Wendy Phillips' name to serve on Nominating Committee. Approval will be sought in Sixth Month.

5. Nominating.

Roland Heath reported that Caroline Noyes is nominated to serve as Recording Clerk, and Carolyn Coburn Allen is nominated to serve as Administration Committee Clerk. Approval will be sought in Sixth Month.

Roland reported that a volunteer teacher is needed for the Nursery to look after the 3-5 year olds.

The Meeting approved Perry Treadwell to be newsletter editor:

Minute 09-05-06: Atlanta Friends Meeting approves Perry Treadwell to be the Newsletter Editor.

Perry is satisfied with his support committee, and hopes that we will revisit this topic so that the next newsletter editor knows what to expect regarding a formal, ongoing support structure.

7. Treasurer.

Meredith Reynolds reported that Fundraising has raised \$316 from the Plant and Yard Sale for the meeting. She expressed a special thanks to Myrna Trapp who donated \$200 from this sale. There has been \$35,358 raised through April 30. There is a \$9,806 deficit so far this year, which is better than usual, compared to the last few years.

8. Ferguson Cabin Committee

Kathy Johnson reported we received a \$5,000 check this morning, which brings the total amount of funds for the cabin renovations to \$15,000. She was concerned that the minute that the Meeting approved for cabin renovations last month did not mention any preparations for a new cabin and washhouse. Before approving a cabin and washhouse, the Meeting has asked for a formal report from the Ferguson Cabin Committee detailing the phases, the funds and time involved in each phase so that we can all have a clear understanding of what is planned for the cabin.

9. Social Concerns.

Among other topics, Julia Ewen reported that Sue May is actively lobbying to decrease the use of Cluster Bombs by the armed forces. Social Concerns approved Sue's request that the Clerk of Meeting sign a letter to our two U.S Senators, asking them to support pending legislation to limit and control use of these type munitions.

The Clerk will sign the letter on behalf of the meeting.

10. SAYMA.

Ceal Wutka shared her report from the SAYMA Representatives Meeting with Meeting for Business. Please see attached minutes for full report. The next FWCC regional meeting will be held in Fall of 2010. SAYMA will sponsor the regional meeting, and is looking for a monthly meeting to host FWCC. Ceal suggested that Atlanta Friends Meeting consider hosting. This will require providing beds for 30 people, a significant commitment. So as not to overburden certain friends and the Hospitality Committee, friends expressed a desire to know that the Meeting was supportive of this project before agreeing to host. Ceal will talk to Hospitality Committee and put a brief note in the newsletter and announcement sheet. She will also bring it up with Care and Counsel. The written report is attached to the file copy of the minutes

11. Other Business.

The Meeting approved a minute of thanks to Elizabeth Tolmach for her service as Recording Clerk in 2009.

Minute 09-05-06: Atlanta Friends Meeting thanks Elizabeth Tolmach for her patience and discerning ear as she served the meeting as Recording Clerk from January through May 2009. The meeting wishes her a spiritually rich and fulfilling experience in Chicago.

The meeting closed with silent worship.
