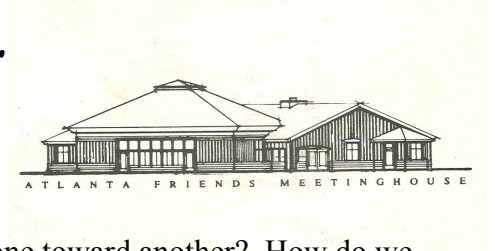

QVS BOARD APPOINTS EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR; FIRST COHORT ARRIVES

The QVS Board is pleased to announce the appointment of **Christina Repoley** as our Executive Director beginning August 1. Christina, a member of the Atlanta Friends Meeting, has carried a leading to bring QVS to life for a number of years, having been part of the organizing team of the initial consultation that started the current effort, and as a member of the QVS board since its inception. She is a 2011 Master of Divinity graduate from Emory University's Candler School of Theology. Since graduation, in addition to a considerable amount of time spent on the QVS startup, Christina has worked as the Program Coordinator for the Faith and Service Program of the Cousins Family Foundation, supporting and consulting with a national network of faith-based voluntary service programs. "Christina brings a strong calling for this work as well as considerable experience with and knowledge of voluntary service programs," says John Holding, clerk of the QVS board. "We are thrilled and grateful that Christina will be serving as the founding Executive Director of QVS."



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We are also pleased to introduce you to the **First Ever Cohort of Quaker Voluntary Service**. The Cohort will be moving to Atlanta at the end of August to begin 11 months of community living, Quaker practice, spiritual development, and work that contributes to the mission of several dynamic organizations in Atlanta. Their experience will be under the spiritual care of the Meeting and will be guided by the QVS Executive Director and Board. **Orientation begins August 27!**

Becca Bass graduated from Haverford College in May 2012 where she majored in Psychology and Educational Studies. Her senior thesis was titled "Transformational Processing of Negative Events Through Writing: An Experimental Manipulation." Becca has dedicated much of her energy to issues of education and education reform. She was a founding member of Buffalo ReformEd, an education reform policy nonprofit in her hometown. She was also the founding president of the Haverford chapter of Students for Education Reform. Becca lived in intentional community with the same group during her four years at Haverford. Introduced to Quakerism while at Haverford, she looks forwards to learning and experiencing more this year with QVS. Becca will be serving at Atlanta Habitat for Humanity, where she will work as a family services assistant, working with families to access the resources of Habitat for Humanity and engaging in community outreach and education.



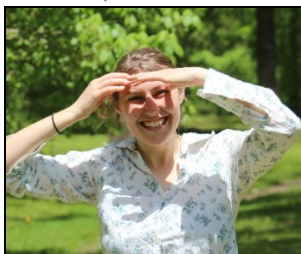

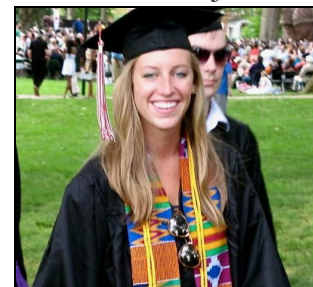

Justin grew up attending both Quaker meeting and Jewish synagogue regularly and considers himself to be part of both faith traditions. He is active in Southern Illinois Quaker Meeting where he currently serves as Recording Clerk. Justin will work as the Communications Associate at Clarkston Development Foundation, whose mission is to work closely with refugees, immigrants, Americans and other stakeholders in Clarkston to create a thriving, multicultural neighborhood community supported by holistic programs and support services.



Kelsey McNicholas graduated from Guilford College in 2011 with joint degrees in Peace and Conflict Studies, Sociology, and Anthropology. Her honors thesis was entitled, "On Stories and Authority, Narrative as a Form of Resistance to Systemic Violence in U.S. Immigration Policy." While at Guilford, she was a member of the Quaker Leadership Scholars Program, she studied abroad in Mexico, she received the Newlin Award for Social Concerns from New Garden Friends Meeting, and she was a Bonner Scholar. She also organized an alternative spring break trip to the Mexico border with No More Deaths and she interned in the immigration program of the AFSC's Greensboro office. She currently works as a legal intake volunteer at the ACLU in Philadelphia. Kelsey, like Justin, will be working this year at the Clarkston Development Foundation as the Community Engagement Associate.



Liz Nicholson was raised in the West Richmond Friends Meeting and also attends First Friends in Richmond, Indiana. She graduated from Guilford College in May 2012 where she majored in Psychology and minored in Music. Liz was a member of the Quaker Leadership Scholars Program and served as Co-Clerk of that program, as well as taking other leadership roles in the community. She studied abroad in Ghana where she also worked as a museum guide, and she also worked as an intern in an affordable housing complex for seniors in Greensboro where she shared her gift of music. Liz, like Allison, will be working at The Frazer Center as a job coach in the adult program.



Lisa Scarpelli graduated from Earlham College in May 2012 where she majored in Peace and Global Studies and minored in Spanish and Hispanic Studies. Lisa volunteered at the Dayton Ohio International Peace Museum in the summer of 2010 and participated in Pendle Hill's Young Adult Leadership Development Program in the summer of 2011. She also worked as volunteer staff at the Independent Living Center of Richmond, Indiana for two years. Lisa will be working this year at Georgia Women's Action for New Directions, a grassroots, woman-led organization that seeks to direct women's voices into a powerful movement for change. Their mission is to empower women (and men) to act politically to reduce militarism and violence and to redirect excessive military spending towards unmet human and environmental needs.



Rebecca Sullivan is a lifelong Quaker and has spent her life living in intentional community. She graduated from Guilford College in May 2011 with a double major in Comparative Religion and Peace and Conflict Studies. While at Guilford Rebecca participated in the Quaker Leadership Scholars Program and served as the Co-Clerk. She also studied abroad in Kenya with the School for International Training. In Philadelphia, where she now lives, Rebecca has participated in the Emerging Leaders Scholars Program of Philadelphia Yearly Meeting and is an intern with the Friends Rehabilitation Program as well as with Education Works. Rebecca will do her QVS service at the American Friends Service Committee's Atlanta office, and she will focus on AFSC's emerging work within Atlanta area schools.

After a period of silence, Mary Ann Downey presented a selection from *Timeless Quaker Wisdom in Plainsong* by Paulette Meier (2011).

Query: Bill Holland presented the query, “Do you use your leisure in ways that strengthen your physical, mental, and spiritual life? Do you avoid those habits and recreations that may prove to be harmful to yourself or others? How do you live that your spiritual growth, family, life, and the interests of your Meeting and community are given sufficient consideration and time?”

Care and Counsel: On behalf of both Care and Counsel and Ministry and Worship, Jenny Foster presented a proposal for an Annual Meeting for Welcoming Babies. This is a practice grounded in the tradition of Burundian Friends, and the idea has been well seasoned for about two years by an ad hoc committee comprised of Laura Norlin, Jenny Foster, and Georgia Lord to ensure that cultural adaptations could be made and that this tradition would be an appropriate pathway for Atlanta Friends Meeting. For families who voluntarily choose to participate, during a Meeting for Worship parents would have an opportunity to make public promises to their children while Friends in attendance have the opportunity to provide messages of their own to the children and the families in support of the parents’ promises. The following minute was approved:

Minute 12-07-01: Atlanta Friends Meeting approves holding a Meeting for Worship to take families with children under our care. We agree to witness and support the promises parents make to their children for their spiritual growth. We trust Care and Counsel and Ministry and Worship with planning the best time and place for this special meeting.

Administration: On behalf of the Administration committee, Rick Martinson reported that the procedure for memorial plantings has been written, and will be sent to the discussion list and presented for approval next month.

Ministry and Worship: On behalf of Ministry and Worship, Bill Holland reported that the meeting has received a request from Dean Leeper and Christina Repoley to be married under the care of the meeting. A clearness committee has met with them and found them clear for marriage. Ministry and Worship recommends the marriage be taken under our care. Following our usual practice, we ask the meeting to consider this recommendation over the next month and we will ask the meeting to discern if this is in right order at our 8th month meeting.

Quaker Quest: On behalf of the Quaker Quest planning committee, Bert Skellie gave an update on proceedings. The committee has agreed on the topics and has a list of presenters. Topics will include Quakers and the Worship Experience, Quakers and Peace, Quakers and Equality, and Quakers and Jesus. There will be a half-day workshop will held on Saturday August 4th, from noon to 5pm at the meetinghouse to make final plans. Friends are encouraged to attend this session.

In preparation for the public sessions, Friends are needed for help with social media, including the development and content of a website and Facebook page; with advertising; and with outreach. Assistance is also needed with videotaping the sessions and uploading the content to the web, as well as with providing food and welcoming seekers. Please contact Bert Skellie about ways in which you are led to help.

Treasurer's Report: Peter Sederberg reported that at the end of the second quarter, there is a deficit of \$13,157. Halfway through the year, we have received only about 34% of the budgeted contributions, while rental income is running about \$1,700 above target. Copies of the new SAYMA Guide to Faith and Practice were paid for out of the literature budget, and are available for \$10 from either Bill Holland or Jonah McDonald.

Friend in Residence: Don Bender reported that there were a number of qualified individuals who applied for the position, and that the committee has selected Erica Schoon to be the new Friend in Residence. She will begin in early September, and her mission will be working with QVS. Jim Tolmach (Clerk), Don Bender, Jonah McDonald Christina Repoley, and Beth Ruddiman served on the search committee.

Minute 12-07-02: With gratitude for their service, Atlanta Friends Meeting approves laying down the Friend in Residence search committee.

August Adult Education

On August 5, we will hear Caroline Noyes offer her spiritual journey. We will devote the rest of the month to reading and discussing *Black Fire: African American Quakers on Spirituality and Human Rights*. Copies of the book are available from Bill Holland and all are welcome. Here is an excerpt.

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"What to do in the Meeting for Worship," by N. Jean Toomer
From *Black Fire: African American Quakers on Spirituality and Human Rights*

I never go to the meeting with an itch to speak, though it sometimes happens to me, as to others, that I am moved to speak before arriving at the meeting house. Even so, I usually restrain the urge until we have had at least a short period of silent waiting before God. One is vain indeed if he thinks that his words are more important than this waiting. If I have not been moved to speak before arriving, such an impulse, if it comes at all, is likely to arise after I have been waiting a while. It arises within my silence. An insight or understanding flashes into my mind. A prayer or a pleading or a brief exhortation comes upon me. I hold it in mind and look at it, and at myself. I examine it.

Is this a genuine moving that deserves expression in a meeting for worship or had I best curb and forget it? May it have some real meaning for others, and is it suited to the condition of this meeting? Can I phrase it clearly and simply? If it passes these tests, I regard it as something to be said but I am not yet sure it should be said here and now. To find out how urgent it is, I press it down and try to forget it. If time passes and it does not take hold of me with increased strength, I conclude that it is not to be spoken of at this time. If, on the other hand, it will not be downed, if it rebounds and insists and will not leave me alone, I give it expression.

If it turns out that the words were spoken more in my own will than in the power, I feel that egotistical-I have done it, and that this self-doing has set me apart from the other members of the meeting. I am dissatisfied until again immersed in the life of the group. But if it seems that I have been an instrument of the power, I have the feeling that the power has done it and has, by this very act, joined those assembled even closer. Having spoken, I feel at peace once again, warmed and made glowing by the passage of a living current through me to my fellows. With a heightened sense of fellowship with man and God, I resume my silent practices. . . . The message should form with the silence a seamless whole.
