Charlotte had the opportunity to study abroad twice, once for a semester in Gaborone, Botswana studying Public Health and a second time during the summer in Sikkim, India working to create sustainable relationships with elementary schools in the foothills of the Himalayas. Charlotte will be serving at Atlanta Habitat for Humanity during the year.

After graduating she returned home to Rhode Island where she is working at Apeiron Institute for Sustainable Living as an environmental educator and interning with American Friends Service Committee. After this year, she plans to go to graduate school for sociology or environmental studies, focusing on animal studies and ecofeminism. Hannah has been Quaker her whole life. She will be serving at Atlanta Legal Aid Society, Inc.

While in Tucson, she interned with Casa Mariposa, an ecumenical intentional community engaged in hospitality activism. In visiting immigration detention centers with Casa Mariposa, she became interested in the role community activism can play in the legal system. Genevieve will be serving at Southern Center for Human Rights.

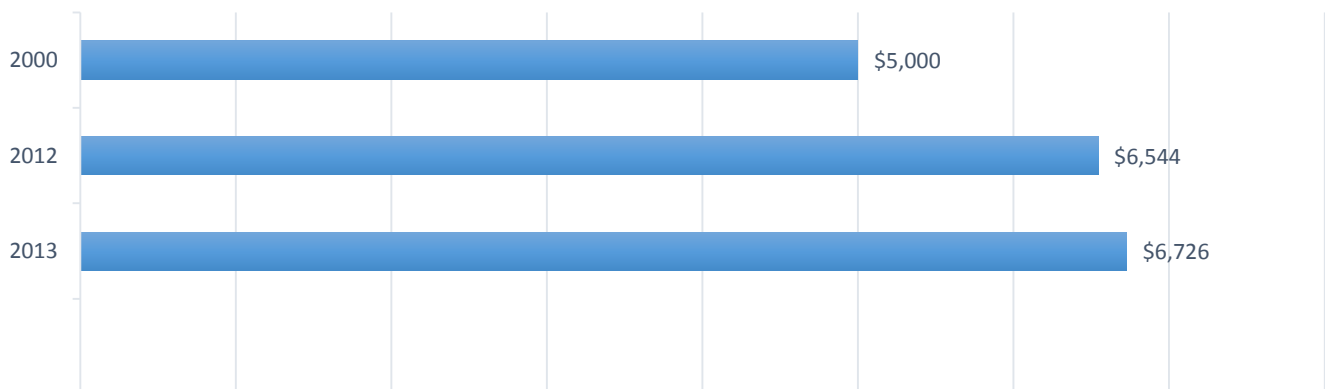

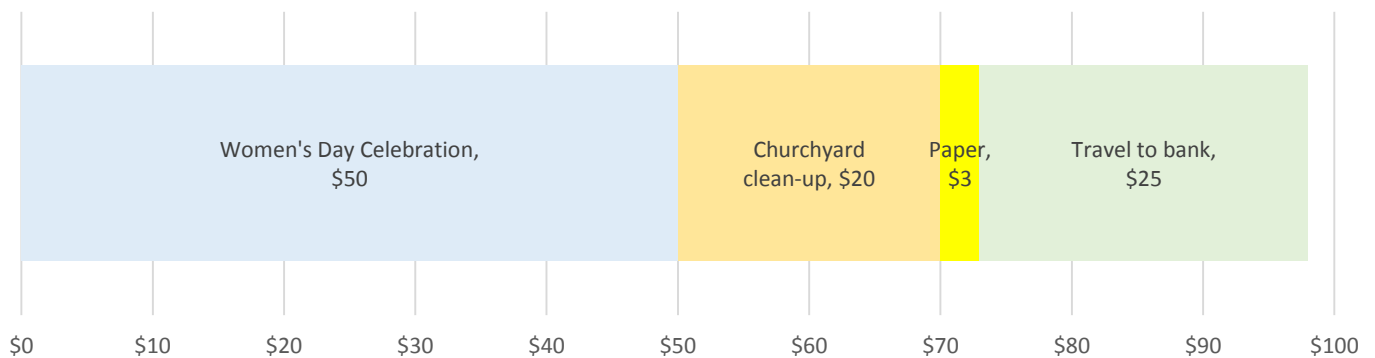
El Sitio Cenícero Women’s Committee Report: Revolving Loan Fund for Women, 2012-2013

Below is a translation of a report, with graphs added, documenting how some of our Social Concerns Committee budget monies have been spent over the years in our sister community of El Sitio, in El Salvador. The following provides information on the administration of the women’s credit program by the Women’s Committee. The program has provided benefits through low interest loans available to all the women in the community of El Sitio.

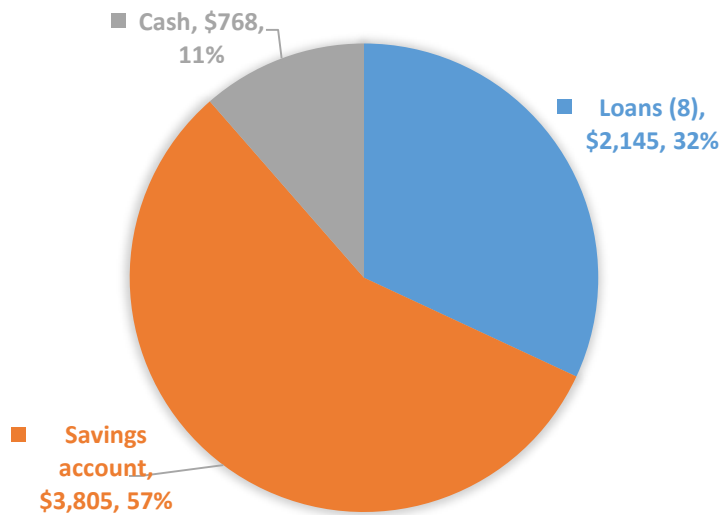
Balance



Expenditures in 2012-2013 - \$98



Destination of Funds - \$6,736



During 2012-2013 eight women had loans ranging from \$150 to \$300 for diverse purposes. Of the eight, seven are current with their interest payments and one has interest debts outstanding of \$30.00.

Observations

The revolving loan program for women, capitalized by funds from the Atlanta Friends Meeting in 2000, has now functioned for over ten years with almost zero defaults and in the more recent years with well-prepared reports and is a credit to the women of the community who have been in charge of the fund.

The Women's Committee made an effort at the beginning of 2014 to encourage more women to apply for loans and increased the loan limit to \$1000 from \$300. It has made 6 new loans for a total of about \$3200. Two of these new loans are to enlarge existing mini-stores in the community.

The Women's Committee now includes young women who have finished high school. Many of the older women cannot read or write. Frank [Cummings] suggested they use some of their profits in a literacy program with the help of the high school graduates using material from the Ministry of Education.

He also suggested there should be a time limit on how long loans are outstanding even though interest payments are maintained.

The Memorial Society of Georgia

The Memorial Society of Georgia was formed in 1973 and many members of the Atlanta Friends Meeting were among its early members as it reflects Quaker values of simplicity, dignity and economy in funeral arrangements. As AFM explores the theme of Conscious Aging, Mindful Dying, it seems important that we are all aware of the benefits of membership in the Memorial Society

The Society is dedicated to providing information to its members that will help them prepare for their end of life choices in sickness and death and recommends that members execute an advance directive document and complete their Memorial Society prearrangement plan.

The advance directive document includes a living will which specifies all aspects of personal care and medical treatment including when that treatment should be withdrawn and Durable Power of Attorney for Health Care which designates a person to make decisions regarding your medical treatment and withdrawal of that treatment when you do not have the ability to make those decisions yourself. We have copies of the brochure "5 Wishes" in preparing for getting those documents completed.

The pre arrangement plan includes choosing from a list of licensed funeral directors from whom the Society has formal commitments to provide cremation or burial for a pre-determined minimum cost.

A person joins the Society through application and payment of a lifetime fee (currently \$35). When you join you receive a pre-arrangement form for each adult member. It is in triplicate form. A copy of the form will be placed in the file of the chosen funeral director. The Society keeps a record and the member keeps the third copy.

The Society is an affiliate of the Funeral Consumers Alliance. Since there are approximately 120 affiliates across the U.S. you can transfer your membership if you move out of state.

The Care and Counsel Committee of AFM will be handing out brochures which give more complete information and lifetime membership application forms. One can also go to the web site www.memorialsocietyofgeorgia.org (phone number 404-634-2896) for information.
